Last week, I played *The Lark Ascending* for a Staff Recital. Our whole recital was in honor of Mari Ellen Reeser, a BFA counselor who passed away on Easter Sunday, ascending to Heaven.

The *Lark* is evocative of not only birds, but rising and soaring emotions. After the recital, some people came up to me and said the piece made them weep – a healing kind of weeping.

Music, especially violin music, 'gives wings to the mind and flight to the imagination' (Plato). In this case, the music allowed my soul to express a depth of emotion that words cannot. Those listening were also uplifted and carried to a place beyond. Sometimes I pray through my music, and others around me also participate in that somehow.

This recital reminded me why I'm here teaching the students music. They are discovering voices for their deepest emotions. They are learning the language of the human heart. It may not seem like much in the day-to-day tuning and correcting of rhythm, but once in a while we glimpse the power of music in expression of the deepest longing and groaning of the spirit.

Even so, these words became their own, a carefully selected grouping of phrases to express something of what made them tick, what made them tick, what made them who they are. I am privileged to see these students for who they are!
